

CHAIRMAN & DIRECTOR MESSAGE

It is our great pleasure to present the 2023 annual report of the Riyadh Memorandum of Understanding on port State control.

One of the most important events that occurred during 2023 was the refurbishment of Riyadh MoU website, committee approved the upgrade of Riyadh ship Information System (RSIS), the launch of RSIS iOS mobile application and the data exchange with GISIS (IMO) was completed.

This annual report provides the overview of port State control activities and developments in Riyadh MoU in 2023. The report also includes port State control statistics and analysis on the results of inspections carried out by member Authorities during the year.

Another great year for Riyadh MoU as we witnessed a 7.06% increase in the number of inspections and a 12% increase in number of inspections with deficiencies in comparison to 2022. A total of 3,926 inspections were reported in RSIS during 2023 out of which 1,250 inspections had deficiencies.

An achievement that needs to be pointed out and that is the resume of inspections in the authority of Kuwait. As in 2023, Kuwait had reported 61 inspections and that is an increase of 52.46% in comparison to the number of inspections reported in the last sixteen years combined.

Below is a brief on statistics for 2023:

- 1. 7.06% increase in the number of inspections conducted by all six member authorities of Riyadh MoU as the total number of inspections for 2023 were 3,926 in comparison to 3,649 inspections of the previous year.
- 2. 12% increase in the number of inspections with deficiencies, from 1,100 in 2022 to 1,250 in 2023.
- 3. Riyadh MoU had recorded 34 detentions in 2023 resulting in a 5.56% drop compared to 2022.
- 4. For the second consecutive year, Riyadh MoU had witnessed the highest recording of number of deficiencies since its its establishment with 4,899 deficiencies. A 2.48% increase in comparison to the total number of deficiencies recorded in 2022 (4792 deficiencies) and a 43.47% increase in total number of deficiencies recorded in 2021 (2,778 deficiencies).
- 5. The authority of Oman (50%), Bahrain (46.81%), and United Arab Emirates (39.84%) have achieved the agreed of 35% ratio in total number of inspections with deficiencies.

- 6. Saudi Arabia authority is still leading the member authorities with 2,084 inspections in 2023, followed by United Arab Emirates (1,378), Qatar (234), Oman (122), Kuwait (61) & Bahrain (47).
- 7. The highest number of inspections occurred in May with 382 inspections recorded and the lowest inspection took place in April with a total of 282 inspections.
- 8. Fire Safety is leading the major categories of deficiencies with 664 deficiencies followed by Propulsion and Auxiliary Machinery 628 deficiencies and Working and Living Conditions Working Conditions with 463 deficiencies.

Finally, we would like to extend our sincere thanks to the Port State Control Committee, member Authorities and all PSC officers for their devoted efforts made, the valuable cooperation rendered, and the respectable work done, which demonstrate the strong potential and enduring driver for the development and achievement of Riyadh MoU.

INTRODUCTION

Since, the establishment of the port State control in this Region, the Riyadh Memorandum of Understanding on port State control (Riyadh MoU) was signed in June 2004 in Riyadh, Kingdom of Saudi Arabia by six GCC member States (United Arab Emirates, Kingdom of Bahrain, Kingdom of Saudi Arabia, Sultanate of Oman, State of Qatar and the State of Kuwait).

The annual report of Riyadh MoU on port State control is published under the auspices of the Port State Control Committee of the Riyadh Memorandum of Understanding on port State control.

This 2023 annual report covers port State control activities, and the main objective of Riyadh MoU and other regional MoUs is to establish an effective port State control regime within their regions, through cooperation of its members and harmonization of their activities, to eliminate substandard shipping as well as to promote maritime safety, protect and safeguard working and living conditions on board ships and the protection of the marine environment within its jurisdiction.

21 PSC Committee Meeting of Riyadh MOU on port State control was held in Doha, State of Qatar from 19 - 21 February 2024 under the chairmanship of Capt. Yousef Mohamed Alhosan – Vice President of Policies & Legislations at the Saudi Ports Authority (MAWANI).

The meeting was attended by all member authorities: United Arab Emirates, Bahrain, Saudi Arabia, Oman, Qatar and Kuwait. Paris MoU Secretary and Med MoU Deputy Secretary General had attended as observers.

TRANING /WORKSHOPS ORGANIZED BY RIYADH MoU



RIYADH MoU FIRST GENERAL TRAINING COURSE

To enhance the capabilities of the PSCOs within the Riyadh MoU region, the Secretariat organized the following three training courses and workshops (theoretical & practical) which were approved by the committee to be conducted in 2023:


- Ballast Water Management (BWM), in coordination with ClassNK and in cooperation with the representative of Qatar was conducted in Doha from 04 - 08 June 2023. The training focused on enabling the PSCOs and crew onboard ships to become familiar with the ballast water management methods commonly used to meet the requirements of the International Convention for Control and Management of Ships Ballast Water and sediments.
- 2. CIC in Fire training, in coordination with DNV and in cooperation with the representative of Saudi Arabia was conducted in Jeddah from 27– 31 Augut 2023. This training was focused on ensuring the PSCOs are familiarized with inspecting the vessel and its crew according to the CIC questionnaire.
- 3. Riyadh MoUs 1st General training Course (GTC1), in coordination with DNV and cooperation with the representative of UAE was conducted in Dubai from 15 19 October 2023. It was about the international conventions issued by the Internationa Maritime Organization, with the aim of participants learning about the details of the conventions and legal references.

STATISTICS

INSPECTIONS:

In 2023, Riyadh MoU had witnessed a 7.06% increase in the number of inspections conducted by all six member authorities as the total number of inspections for 2023 were 3,926 inspections in comparison to 3,649 of the previous year.


Chart 1 has the breakdown per month:

DEFICIENCIES:

In 2023, 4,899 deficiencies were recorded in the Riyadh MoU region. A 2.48% increase in total number of deficiencies recorded in 2022 (4,792 deficiencies) and a 43.47% increase in total number of deficiencies recorded in 2021 (2,778 deficiencies).



DETENTIONS

Detentions:

In 2023, Riyadh MoU region had witnessed a 5.56% drop in the number of detentions from 36 in 2022 to 34 vessels in 2023.


CONCENTRATED INSPECTION CAMPAIGN

The Riyadh MoU on port State control carried out a Concentrated Inspection Campaign (CIC) on Fire Safety between 1 September and 30 November 2023.

During the campaign period; a total of 785 inspections were carried out with the CIC questionnaire resulting in one detention. The overall CIC detention rate was 0.13%.

The detained type of ship included one container Vessel.
